



Propagation



When are the bands open? These charts, generated using CAPman, show probabilities for average HF propagation in the month of **August** for the paths indicated. The horizontal axes show Coordinated Universal Time (UTC), and the vertical axes frequency in MHz. On 10% of the days of this period, the highest frequencies propagated will be at least as high as the upper red curves (HPF, highest possible frequency) and on 30% of the days they will be at least as high as the green curves (MUF, classical maximum usable frequency). The blue curves show the lowest usable frequency (LUF) for a 1500-W CW transmitter. For SSB or a lower transmitter power, the LUF will be somewhat higher than the blue curves indicate. See Oct 1994 QST, pp 27-30, and Feb 1995 QST, pp 34-36, for more details. The predictions assume an observed 2800-MHz solar flux value of 81. This is a **Low** level of solar activity. See the detailed propagation tables on *The ARRL Antenna Book CD-ROM*.

5. The test fee of \$15 - cash, check, or money order.





From Apollo / Leechburg: Take Rt. 66 S to Rt. 380. Take 380 W to Rt. 366. Take Rt. 366 W (toward New Kensington) to the end of the 4 lane. Go ¼ mile past the end of the 4 lane. Turn right on Whitten Hollow Road. Go about ¼ mile to first stop sign. Turn right on Turkey Ridge Road. Go about ½ mile to top of hill. Skyview is on the left.

From New Kensington: Take Rt. 366 E. Go about 5 miles from the Parnassas area. Look for the Hannan Building on the left. Go about 100 yards past the Hannan Building (If you get to the 4 lane, you went too far). Turn left on Whitten Hollow Road. Go about ¼ mile to first stop sign. Turn right on Turkey Ridge Road. Go about ½ mile to top of hill. Skyview is on the left.

From Monroeville / Parkway: Take Rt. 286 E to Rt. 380 E. Take Rt. 380 E to Rt. 366. Take Rt. 366 W (toward New Kensington) to the end of the 4 lane. Go ¼ mile past the end of the 4 lane. He was gracious and answered my many quests for information.



I have always found Dennis to be very knowledgeable of Amateur Radio stuff. I have asked him many times about radio related things. He didn't know it was something I had been working on at home. I'd be willing to bet he didn't even know how much he had helped me. I have only been a Ham for three years, I have much to learn. Denny has always been welcoming and kind to me.

When I called him for this interview we talked for at least two hours. Two Hams, who would have known we would talk for so long? (hee hee). Anyone that knows us! We talked about Ham radio mostly, though we “chased a few rabbits”. Denny has a great love of railroading. That was only one of the “off the track” subjects we had talked about.



The March 1935 *Short Wave Craft* magazine contained a caption contest, inviting readers to submit titles for the cover. Winning entries were published in the July 1935 issue.



The magazine received an amazing 16,000 entries, including many duplicates. Some of those repeated many times were: When to Listen In, Ohm Sweet Ohm, The Radio Bed-Bug, Scrambled Speech, Uncontrollable Oscillation, Short Waves and Long Raves, The Radio Widow, A Strong Local Cuts In, and Too Much Feedback.

Sigh. Maybe the 1930s just weren't a funny time.

In any case, the first prize winner received a Pilot 11 Super-Dragon receiver, which sounds pretty cool. Second through fifth places hauled in kits. One hundred prizes were awarded in total, although by the time you reached fifteenth place, the prizes were things like a battery or one's choice of any 50-cent book published by the company.

Perhaps it was a custom in early radio circles to make awful puns. In any case, the winners included some of the worst groaners I've ever seen. The publisher provided translations in parentheses in cases where the joke was too obscure to fathom.
