

THE HISTORY OF THE BVARA PART 8

THE 1990s

The decade of the 1990s witnessed continuing social activities within the BVARA.

The growing separation of the two Beaver County radio organizations continued with worsening relationships during the decade of the 1990s.

GLOBAL EVENTS IN THE 1990s

Culturally, the 1990s were characterized by the rise of multiculturalism and alternative media. Movements such as grunge, the rave scene and hip hop spread around the world to young people during the decade, aided by thennew technology such as cable television and the Internet.

A combination of factors, including the continued mass mobilization of capital markets through neo-liberalism, the thawing of the decades-long Cold War, the beginning of the widespread proliferation of new media such as the Internet from the middle of the decade onwards, increasing skepticism towards government, and the dissolution of the Soviet Union led to a realignment and reconsolidation of economic and political power across the world and within

countries. Many countries such as Canada and Sweden privatized much of their economy, moving power away from governments, and more towards private corporations. The dot com bubble of 1996-2000 brought wealth to some entrepreneurs before its crash in 2000-2001.

The most prominent natural disasters of the decade included Hurricane Andrew striking South Florida in August 1992, the crippling super storm of March 1993 along the Eastern Seaboard, the devastating 1994 Northridge earthquake in Los Angeles, the Blizzard of 1996 in the eastern U.S., the U.S. drought of 1999, and the destructive Oklahoma tornado outbreak in May 1999.

In 1990 the Hubble Telescope was launched into orbit from the Space Shuttle Atlantis. The collapse of the Soviet Union and Operation Desert Storm happened in 1991. The riots in Los Angeles after the Rodney King verdict occurred in 1992. In 1993 the cult compound in Waco, Texas was bombed. That same year, the World Trade Center in New York was also bombed. In 1994 the Channel Tunnel opened between Britain and France. Pro football star O.J. Simpson was arrested for murder that same year. A liquid-sarin gas attack was made in a Tokyo subway in 1995. The Federal Building in Oklahoma City, OK was also attacked by bomb in 1995. Mad Cow disease hit Britain in 1996. In 1997 comet Hale-Bopp became prominently visible and the Mars Pathfinder with the

Britain died in a car crash. In 1998 U.S. President Bill Clinton was impeached by the House of

Representatives while Viagra went on the market. In 1999, fear of the turn of the century causing massive system failures resulted in much effort to mitigate the "Y2K" bug as it was called. The killing spree at Columbine High School also happened in 1999.

TECHNOLOGY EVENTS IN THE 1990s

In 1991, CERN publicized the new World Wide Web (WWW) project. During the decade of the 1990s advancements in computer modems, ISDN, cable modems, and DSL enabled faster connection to the Internet. The Pentium processor was developed by the Intel Corporation, and e-mail became popular. Businesses began to build E-commerce websites: Ecommerce-only companies such as Amazon.com, eBay, AOL, and Yahoo! grew rapidly.

The introduction of affordable, smaller satellite dishes and the DVB-S standard in the mid-1990s expanded satellite television services that carried up to 500 television channels. CD burner drives were introduced and the CD-ROM drive became standard for most personal computers during the decade.

BEAVER COUNTY IN THE 1990s

The 1990 US Census reported a total of 186,093 people in Beaver County for a declining rate of 9.0 percent over the 1980 US Census. The decline of the steel industry was now impacting the population of the county.

In 1992 the Beaver Valley

Expressway opened between Chippewa and New Castle. The toll for that segment was fifty cents. A blizzard buried Beaver County in 1993. That same year USAir cut its workforce affecting many employees living in the county. January 19th, 1994 became the coldest day on record in Western Pennsylvania with a recorded temperature of -22 degrees Fahrenheit. January 1994 recorded a monthly snowfall of 36 inches to accompany the severe cold weather. Widespread flooding on the Beaver River caused considerable damage on January 19th, 1996. Later that year on June 19th five inches of rain fell in Beaver County. At the Northern Lights Shopping Center 21 of 45 stores were damaged from flooding caused by the heavy rainfall.

In 1998 work began on the construction of a new county jail to house 371 prisoners at a site in Hopewell Township near Aliquippa. This new jail would replace the then oldest jail in the state that was built back in 1858 or 1859. In 1998 a new National Gypsum Plant opened in Shippingport and in September 1998 Boscov's opened a new store at the Beaver Valley Mall at the site of the old Lazarus store.

HAM EQUIPMENT, REGULATION AND TECHNOLOGY

Even though the Morse speed requirement was set at 5 WPM for Technicians and Novices, Morse code continued to discourage many potential hams, who could point at the dwindling importance of Morse in military and commercial communications worldwide. Following intense debate in the amateur community the ARRL proposed that a new, code-free Technician license be created, with access to bands above 30 MHz. The FCC agreed in 1991 and growth of the amateur service took off again, reaching over 700,000 US licensees by the end of the decade. Amid predictions of doom by some, the "codeless Techs" went on the air, built repeaters, joined clubs and emergency organizations and took leadership positions.

The Internet dramatically reshaped the world in a few short years and had a profound and increasing impact over time on amateur radio. The fascination of computers and the Internet attracted many of the young, technically inclined people who in previous years had often found their way into Amateur Radio. Beaver County radio clubs felt their effects. This challenge, and others, caused some to predict the death of our service at the hands of computers in general and the Internet in particular.

HAM CLUB AND MEMBER ACTIVITIES

The BVARA during the 1990s (sometimes known as the "low bands" club) continued to be socially active with Field Day, the Corn Roast, the PA QSO Party, the Christmas Dinner and other activities. Looking at the BVARA's QRM Newsletters from 1991, members could get together each

week for breakfast on Saturday morning at Cosmos and lunch on a different day at Lance's Port. Tom Merz, N4KRA, regularly contributed lists of shortwave broadcasts in English for the newsletter. MARS Net activity was also frequently listed. License exams were regularly offered by club members who were also Volunteer Examiners (VEs). Annual BVARA dues were \$15 with lower rates for other situations. Many packet radio demos were given at the monthly meetings along with construction tips in the newsletter for building "home brew" packet equipment. Space satellite frequencies were routinely listed. Announcements included club participation in the PA QSO Party from the home of Bud Householder, WA3JPJ, using the club call, W3SGJ. Bulletin Board System (BBS) phone numbers were regularly given as well as locations for computer aficionados like the O.C.U.G. for sharing ideas as well as software as the "hammer" had not yet fallen on software piracy. An amusing article appeared in one 1991 issue about applying for membership in the West Virginia Bow Hunter's Association.

In 1991 the club had 96 members. During the decade membership slowly declined to 64 members in 1998. The CB boom was over, conflicts with the other Beaver County club continued as well as some less than appropriate actions by members of both clubs. These and other factors drove membership down and further

BVARA SOCIAL EVENTS

Many of the club's social events were documented with pictures. Below are a few snapshots of these moments in time.

Many of the BVARA social events were documented with photographs. One example of the level of participation is shown in the 1992 Christmas Party that was held at Kathy's Kitchen. Field Day was always a popular club event with a food event combined with the contest. In 1993 Eddie Woodson arrived to participate with his CW skills. He was a respected long-time member whose novice station appeared in the historical article about the 1950s. In 1994 George Hostovichak, NN3J, still an active BVARA member, is shown operating in the 1994 Field Day Contest. That same year, a popular group activity at the annual Corn Roast was a rousing game of "Throw the Toilet Seat" as shown in a 1994 picture (bottom R).

The 1995 issues of the QRM Newsletter described a Fox Hunt and also began including paid advertising on the last few pages. In 1997 the BVARA was designated as the Official Special Event Station for the PA QSO Party. The event was held on "Paine Mountain" in Independence Township – the home of Ron Paine, K3OIW. Ron heavily promoted participation in the hopes of putting six to eight

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transmitters in simultaneous operation for the QSO Party. By 1999 the PA QSO Party by the BVARA Club included computers at each station with logging software. These were wired computer systems that were interconnected because wireless technology had not yet arrived. Bob Reid, N3SVM, was awarded the 1999 "Ham of the Year" by the BVARA.

The 1995 Corn Roast picture captures some of the quantities of corn that were required and the number of volunteers that were needed to "shuck" the corn.

NEXT TIME

Next time we'll move ahead into the 21st Century and continue our final historical journey as we follow the late history of the BVARA. We'll look at what was happening around the globe and locally during the new century. The resolution to the conflict between the two clubs was the result of a final event that required the passage of time and new members to join the organization so that healthy changes could bring about renewal. Stay tuned! ¬
