- The Scouts in attendance can't wait until Field Day. Throughout the entire event, all they could talk about was forming "Teams" from within their Troop to operate.

On June 27, 28 and 29, perhaps one of the largest Field Days in Beaver County history will take place at Brady's Run Park. No, I can't make you any promises or guarantees; however, what I can tell you is that over 20+ Scouts from BSA Troop 405 will attend and that over 500 Field Day invitations will be mailed to prospective Explorer Post members within the county courtesy of the



Greater Pittsburgh BSA Council (this mailing can be found on the last four pages of this issue). I can also tell you that we may be joined by members of other Scout Troops that are interested in earning Radio Merit Badges.

The BVARA has reached a critical juncture. At one time, our club boasted over 300 members and operated 33Alpha for Field Day. Last year at this time, Field Day was canceled due to lack of interest and our membership was down to 22. Today, our membership has increased to 43 and is growing. Both our newsletter and website have gained national attention– with a circulation of 500+ and monthly hits exceeding that of the ARRL WPA Section website!

With <u>YOUR</u> help, Field Day 2008 can mark the beginning of a new era for amateur radio in Beaver County. As part of this year's Field Day educational program, we hope to introduce 40 new Scouts and their parents to our hobby. All Scouts that enroll in our Field Day Radio Merit Badge classes will be given Technician Class license manuals and an opportunity to attend <u>FREE</u> licensing courses. These classes will begin in August and will be offered every Wednesday evening from 6:00 PM to 7:00 PM at the American Legion in Baden.

The future of amateur radio in Beaver County is now in <u>YOUR</u> hands. Please plan to participate in this year's event; and, even if you don't want to set-up a station, we have a urgent need for control operators.
