



Radio Clubs Support Outdoor Immersion Resilient Service Members Classic

On Veteran's Day, Saturday, November 11, 2023 members of both the Beaver Valley Amateur Radio Association and Triple 'A' Amateur Radio Association provided communications support for the Resilient Service Members Classic (RSMC) which was held in the Raccoon Creek State Park. The RSMC benefits a group called Outdoor Immersion that helps veterans with the transition from military back to civilian life. The RSMC consists of a 5k trail run, a 20-mile trail run, and a 50k trail run. The 20-mile and 50k runs use trails along the perimeter of the state park and there are five checkpoint/aid stations throughout the park to support those runners. The 5k run is done on a separate trail and needs no support from radio operators.

Radio operators began arriving at the Recreation Hall, which was also the start/finish line, at 7 AM to a rather cool 28° F morning. Several of us had helped with this event in the past, so assignments were already determined prior to our arrival at the park. We quickly set up the antenna for net control and then the checkpoint operators began heading to their assigned areas for the 8 AM race start.

There were a total of 28 runners in the 50k race, however only 23 completed the race in the allotted time with finish times ranging from 4 hour 47 minutes to 9 hours 8 minutes. The 20-mile race had 25 runners who all finished with times ranging from 3 hours 28

minutes to 7 hours 3 minutes.

The terrain in Raccoon Creek State Park is quite hilly, which not only creates a challenge for the runners, it makes radio communication a bit tough without the use of the 24-foot mast and 5dB gain antenna at net control. Operators at the various checkpoints used equipment that ran the gamut from portable radios all the way to mobile radios powered from batteries and using antennas either on tripods, hung in trees, or magnet mounts on vehicles.

Once the radio operators had their equipment set up radio checks were completed. Communication from each checkpoint to net control was verified and some of the checkpoints could even communicate with each other. Duties included reporting runner "bib" numbers back to net control as well as passing a message to a specific runner and reporting the occasional injury. Fortunately, no one required major medical assistance.

On at least three occasions throughout the day the head of Outdoor Immersion, Jim Skal, told us that this event could not happen with the assistance provided by amateur radio.

As duties at each checkpoint finished, operators returned to the Recreation Hall where they were able to have a lunch of Subway sandwiches, chili, and potato soup provided by the Outdoor Immersion group.

We also decided this year to try experimenting with a portable UHF repeater that was provided by Sean, K3UKE. Sean parked in the Roadside East picnic area and was able to erect a 15-foot mast topped with a Hustler G6 antenna. The repeater was set up in Sean's vehicle and powered by a large-capacity battery. Doug, N4YKQ, traveled to several checkpoints for the purpose of testing portable coverage. Other checkpoint operators were encouraged to bring UHF equipment and test coverage during lulls in race activity. We learned that we have some obstacles to overcome, but the experiment was encouraging.

Ham radio participants were: Jack, KZ3Z, and Pam, W3PMS, at net control. Roy, K3BBC, at Checkpoint #1. Ed, N3SDO, and John, KC3QCG, at Checkpoint #2. Greg, KC3TFW, at Checkpoint #3. Dan, KB3VSP, at Checkpoint #4. Doug, K3GTX, at Checkpoint #5. Sean, K3UKE, UHF repeater experiment. Doug, N4YKQ, net manager.

All totaled, ham operators provided approximately 95 volunteer hours to Outdoor Immersion for this event.



The Darlington Museums, A Remarkable Field Trip

On Saturday, November 18th, 2023, a Field Trip to the unique Museums of Darlington was arranged by Jim, KC3IXE that included very knowledgeable Docents from the Little Beaver Historical Society. Eight BVARA-related people experienced a museum tour, long to be remembered. Our tour included three of the four museums with specialized content and many rare pieces.

The tour started with the *McCarl Industrial and Agricultural Museum* that featured machines that were used by local companies in times past. This highly specialized museum is a great place to visit if you're interested in machinery and local history.



They have an extensive collection of industrial artifacts from the 19th and 20th century, and visitors can get up close to displays and see how things work. At certain times, they have live demonstrations of their working equipment.

As we entered the door, a large steam engine and a Downie Water Pump over eight feet tall ominously welcomed us to a very different kind of museum. A Beaver Falls company built the engine, with large, wide belts that was used in oil fields in the surrounding area during the 19th Century. On special occasions this engine and water pump are put into operation but with compressed air rather than steam, for safety reasons.

We wondered about the many focus areas of the museum, Jim, one of the Docents (or knowledgeable specialists) personally guided us through so many areas with much more information than was contained in the information signs that identified some of the more bizarre pieces of equipment. He also gave us a bit of the history of the piece and the industrial company that produced it. There were also numerous group photos of all of the employees of small manufacturing companies within Beaver County.

Some of the specialty areas focused on a collection of items made by prisoners using only wooden matches and glue. A detailed acoustic guitar, a sailing ship, interlocking wooden chains were only a few of these prisoner-made exhibits.

With a seasonal flavor, specialized train layouts and scenery were being assembled by volunteers for the upcoming festivities in December. One unique part of the scenery depicted a UFO hovering over a farm with a cow being slowly raised into the bottom of the UFO while the farmer tried to retrieve his cow with a long, attached rope

Another miniature train layout item featured a drive-in burger shop complete with a 1956 Chevy and an attractive food waitress who moved from inside to outside using her roller skates. Now that was a unique, fast food way of providing service!

One corner of the large display room featured items found around a gas station and many wall signs reflecting a favorite oil or brand of gasoline. Perhaps they even sold vacuum tubes, condensers, and headphones for the hobbyist. A small collection of shortwave and AM radios were displayed in another area of the museum.

Against the wall, right after we entered the museum, was an old IBM 604 Computer that was produced from 1948 through 1952. This machine could do simple calculations based on the use of punched cards that were fed into it. It used vacuum tubes to perform its operations. This is a rare machine with only three others known to exist; one of which is in California and one is in Switzerland. Shell, as it demolished the Horsehead Industries plant in Potter Township, donated this machine to the museum.

So many items on display, so much history, and each one with a story that our Docent knew. A separate area displayed memorabilia from The Great War, World War 1, The War to End All Wars. Two rifles were prominently displayed; a British, Standard Issue, Lee Enfield 0.303 caliber rifle and an M1903 Springfield 30-06 rifle. A photo is displayed of four men in the trenches who are waiting, sleeping, and writing a letter to a loved one while they wait for the next call to attack. A Roll of Honor Roster of the men who served in battle from Company "D" 332nd Infantry from Camp Sherman, OH is displayed, complete with training camp photos of their preparations.

Archaeological excavations at the prehistoric man site, located on the north bank of the Ohio River midway between the communities of Vanport and Ohioville, have been in progress intermittently since 1959 through 1979. Some 6,000 or more years of Indian culture in our area has been studied at this stratified location. The museum displays many of the discovered artifacts that include blades and scrapers, slate necklace pieces, and so much more.

In addition to what is described above, so many more displays were viewed and enjoyed. The Townsend History Room located off to one side contains many more exhibits.

Just down the block on Plum Street sits *The Little Beaver Museum*, previously known as The Second Greersburg Academy. Built in 1883, this two-story building eventually served as the Darlington High School through the mid-20th century. The first floor now displays historic artifacts from towns throughout Beaver County.

The Greersburg Academy on Market Street was built in 1802 and is the oldest surviving public building in Beaver County. This landmark originated as an institution of higher learning, the first one north of the Ohio River. It later served as a railroad depot and you can still see where the railroad tracks used to run parallel to the building.

Harriet Beecher Stowe's classic novel, *Uncle Tom's Cabin* and also shown with sheet music by Stephen Foster.



The upright piano of John Wallace, a music composer and friend of John Philip Sousa who also composed many popular military and marching band pieces of music.



The McCoy Log Cabin was built in Ohio around 1812. It demonstrates what early frontier life was like in the region during the 19th century. At Christmastime, the cabin is visited by Santa, who meets with boys and girls from the community, even as far away as Pittsburgh. Because of the preparations to the log cabin for Santa's arrival, it was not available for us to tour.

We spent four packed hours visiting the three museum buildings. We wish to thank both Jim at the McCarl Museum and Bev at the Little Beaver Museum and the Greersburg Academy for their very informative and knowledgeable descriptions and information that they provided to us.
