

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Winter Field Day 2024 – BVARA Results



On January 27th and 28th, the BVARA participated in an EMCOM exercise called Winter Field Day (WFD). The Association sponsoring the event states that: "WFD is a learning experience, and we hope at the end of this year's WFD exercise, you will feel more confident about your ability to adapt and overcome adverse weather conditions."

As Jim, KC3IXE and I were installing our temporary 40-meter dipole prior to the event, Murphy's Law struck. The antenna had been raised up 50 feet on one end and the other end was attached to a rope that had been strung over a tall tree in the woods about 100 feet away. A measurement of the SWR on the first length of coax gave us the expected minimum reading at about 7.20 MHz, as planned. But as we connected the final length of coax to that 1st length and then guided the coax all the way inside along an out-of-the-way path to the radio, we re-measured the SWR. To our surprise, the SWR was now completely unacceptable. We had a spare length of coax that we could not quite so quickly exchange with the bad length and resolved the problem, but we finished the swap before WFD began. In an emergency situation, we were prepared with contingencies for such situations. Such regular simulations of emergencies had served us well.

Our three SDR transceivers were each connected to a PC with the latest version of the N3FJP Field Day software. These PCs were wirelessly connected in an internal network configuration with the master database installed on one of the PCs. All three station operators had acquired good familiarity with both the software and the network interface. All equipment including transceivers, network, and antennas operated without any problems.


Band conditions were very good. Very good propagation and low atmospheric noise made signals appear to pop out above the background. As the power limit was set at 100 watts by the rules of WFD, location and antenna played a larger role in busting pileups and making the contact. Bands opened earlier and stayed open longer providing improved conditions for finding missed ARRL Sections.

Shown above on the top are the total contacts that were made on each band by mode. The table just below that, shows the bands used by each participating BVARA member. By using a Triplexer, two of the operators were able to use the Yagi antenna at the same time. A total of 70 percent of all contacts were made on 20 and 40 meters. Operators began operation on 40, 20, and 15 meters when WFD started at 2:00 pm local time. 40 meters remained open to well after 11:30 pm on Saturday. Operators switched to 80 meters when significant duplicate stations were encountered after the Sun had set. On Sunday morning, operators began on 40, 20, and 15 meters. When duplicate stations were encountered on 40 and 20 meters, 10 and 15 meters were activated by the BVARA team.



Shown above is the Map of Sections from the N3FJP WFD software program that illustrates, by being filled with a color, the ARRL Sections that were contacted by the BVARA WFD team. This map illustrates how well we were able to make contacts. Classic missing sections included Northern New York, Nebraska, and Eastern Washington State. Ontario Province was subdivided several years ago to better represent the population density around Toronto. The majority of the white area of Ontario has a very low population density, by comparison. In spite of this, Alaska, Hawaii, Puerto Rico, and 10 DX countries were easily worked because of the very good propagation.

A very satisfying feeling of accomplishment was achieved by the three operators. Clearly, there was room to easily accommodate three more operators with our setup. Quite easily, a fourth transceiver could have been left on the Yagi Triplexer with no other changes required.

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Jim, KC3IXE enjoying operating an ICOM-7300 on mostly 40 meters with some additional time on 10 meters. Jim was very effective with the temporary dipole that we hoisted high into the air.

Tom, N3XC enjoying good band openings with his ICOM-7300 on 15 meters. He used the Skyhawk 10-element, no traps Yagi to snag some weak, but needed sections.



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Rich, K3SOM using a Flex Radio 6700 enjoying many contacts on mostly 20 meters with additional time on 10 and 80 meters. In addition to the Yagi, a Doublet antenna 140 feet in length that utilized an open-wire transmission line directly into a Palstar BT-1500A balanced antenna tuner was set up for a very quiet 80 meters to add those contacts to our total.

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Rabid Raccoon 100 Ultra Ham Radio Volunteers Are Needed

This March 16 & 17 marks the 3rd annual Rabid Raccoon Race where ham radio operators help over **300 runners** and spectators run over 100 miles. Last year they had 50 some people run 100 miles around 356 runner did the 100 kilometers run and the largest group the marathon race.

There are some major changes this year: First, the race has moved to a new park it is now in the Brady Run Park which is an Beaver county park just north of Beaver Falls. The park looks a lot like Raccoon SP with hills and a lake. The Second major change is all the Aid Stations are in buildings this year. So no more tents next to a road with coal trucks zooming by.

There are 3 aid stations that you can pick from:

Aid Station #1: Brady Lodge

Aid Station #2 & #3: Four Season Lodge

Aid Station 4: Recreation Hall {Ice Skating Rink & Tennis Court} This is also the Start Finish line.

Since this is an 36 hour long event there are four shifts that you can pick from. You will notice that there even an over night shift the runners run though the night and you will be busy since they will be starting a half marathon at midnight.

I will then add you to the list and get you on the email list for more detail information as we get closer to March 16 & 17.

Your duties will be just radio communications. Handle the aid station traffic, runner drop outs, restocking needs. The aid stations will have cooks that will feed you and there will be plenty of snacks to feed on. Plus the world famous pickle juice. {Don't worry there others thing to drink, but the runner love it!}

Astronomical weekends in February will revolve around moon.




Weekend stargazers will get their fill in February as three of the four weekends throughout the month will feature an astronomical event, all of which revolve around the moon. There will also be an additional night for enjoying the night sky this February since it is a leap year, meaning there will be 29 days and nights rather than the typical 28 during the second month of the year. No events in Feb-

ruary require a telescope, but there will be good opportunities for folks to get a closer look with the help of a telescope. This includes people who may have received a new telescope during the holiday season but have yet to point it to the heavens. From the antithesis of a supermoon to a tight-knit bunch of objects around a famous constellation, here are the three events you will not want to miss in February's night sky: The second weekend of February will be the best time of the month for stargazing, not because of a meteor shower or a planetary alignment, but due to the absence of the moon. On Feb. 9, the moon will reach its new phase, a time when it is not visible at night, making the night sky appear darker than other times of the month. While the new moon is a monthly occurrence, February's wintry weather will help to give the stars an extra sparkle. The amount of moisture in the atmosphere during the winter is lower compared to muggy summer nights. As a result, the stars during the winter months appear to twinkle more than they do any other time of the year. However, the drawback is that a teeth-chattering chill often accompanies cloud-free nights during the winter, so sky watchers will need to bundle up before heading outside to soak in the sights of the cosmos. A trio of celestial sights will gather in the sky during the third weekend of February, an event that will be easy for people of all ages to see -- as long as clouds do not spoil the show.

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After sunset on Feb. 17, the moon will appear above the constellation Orion in the southern sky. Jupiter will also be glowing in the same area of the sky to the right of the moon.



If cloudy weather prevails on Feb. 17, there will be additional opportunities to see the astronomical grouping on Feb. 18 and 19, although the moon will appear farther and farther away from Orion and Jupiter with each passing night. Super moons have become viral sensations in recent years, but their smaller counterpart will glow in the sky near the end of the month. As the moon orbits the Earth, there are times when it is closer to the planet, called perigee, and times when it is slightly farther away, known as apogee. February's full moon will coincide with the time when it is farther away from the planet, resulting in a "micromoon," which will appear about 14% smaller and 30% dimmer than a supermoon.
