

Design/Need, Purchase/Build, Current Status, Results, Lessons Learned

Including:

Continuing with our BVARA Presentation Series this year, our topic this month takes us '*One Step Beyond*' by asking several of our club members to talk about one project. That project can be planned for the future, in purchase (parts or kit), putting it together, built, testing, or in current use. For those who seek knowledge in whatever form, here is an opportunity for you! If it's already finished, then what has been your experience with it? What would you change, if anything?

I'm expecting around five club members, more or less, to tell us what they're doing. Nothing formal, feel free to ask constructive questions of our fellow club members; a question starts a conversation, and others may also have questions too. Maybe a club member is stuck at one of the early stages. For example, where can I buy this widget, or can this be built from this or that? You get the idea. Maybe everything is there except for this one item.

To keep some boundaries around this, I suggest that once you start, I will give you an indication that 10 minutes are up and you have five more minutes to finish. That way, the other club members who have agreed to tell us about a project of theirs get an equal opportunity to show the club what they are working on or planning. My indicator is a Staples "*That was easy!*" button.

But wait, there's potentially more! My *Speed Test for μSD and SD Devices* was a quick find on the Internet while I was looking for something else. An article in *QST Magazine* highlighted an inexpensive way to find a practical use of AI and LLAs for hams that created a tremendous level of member interest. I demonstrated a free software package called *SuperCell WX* for displaying, in real time, multiple Level 2 and 3 products based on live NEXRAD weather data. I gave a presentation on connecting a *Quadra*, a small PC no bigger than a pack of cigarettes, to an amazing software application called *HamClock* using a compact and efficient Linux Operating System. The HD upgrade that I did to my Field Day PC with a new Samsung SSD and the performance improvement that I now enjoy was way more than I was expecting. Please contact me to tell your story! This will be one presentation that you won't want to miss!



Our January VE Test Session had one candidate, who achieved his Amateur Radio goal by passing his Technician test. Our electronic filing system once again worked superbly.


Testing was conducted at our normal location at the Beaver County Emergency Services Center in Ambridge, PA. Our next VE Test Session will be on February 12th, 2026.



It's Winter – Why Would We Expect Two Calamities?

The weatherman and Mother Nature teamed up to provide us with real-life challenges on Winter Field Day (WFD) that we did not anticipate. Doug, N4YKQ announced the first calamity on our *groups.io* page earlier in the week that described our plan to be at Raccoon State Park in one of their modern cabins in his <https://groups.io/g/BVARA/> notice to all who follow us.

"The plans for the club to operate Winter Field Day from Raccoon Creek State Park have been canceled.

A few days ago, we were told of a water line issue affecting the cabins and it would not be fixed in time for the event. Then there is the weather forecast. Temperature and wind chill on Saturday morning would make setup dangerously cold and the snowfall forecast for Sunday would make travel to and from the cabin treacherous, to say the least.

So, stay home, stay warm, and enjoy operating Winter Field Day at your leisure. And if you are operating, be aware of any emergency nets that may arise due to the weather and give them the needed bandwidth to operate. Doug, N4YKQ"

We later learned that park officials closed all access to Raccoon State Park so that others would not have to deal with a life-threatening situation.

For my part, the latest N3FJP and FLDigi software for WFD had been loaded into both the client and the server network system and were fully operational a week before the event. With that out of the way, I could then prepare two huge amounts of homemade chile and 'doctored' Bush baked beans with added bacon. I mean, those two containers were HUGE! Other ham equipment, antennas, cables, pots and pans, and personal items had been collected and staged, ready to load up the car.


With lots of other personal tasks and now weather-related things to do, not much time remained for me to enjoy some serious ham radio. Finally, on Sunday afternoon, I managed to operate as K3SOM 1H WPA for a little over an hour and a half. The bands from 40 to 10 meters were in fairly good shape to enable me to make contact with hams in about 31 different locations across the United States. I even managed to make contacts with hams in Hawaii and in Brazil as well as each of the US call areas (0 through 9). With around 8 contacts on each band, I had a good idea of how the propagation gods were willing to help out on WFD. If there had been an emergency situation like a total power loss, I was prepared to operate on all HF bands up through six meters at 100 watts and on 2 meters, as well as 70 cm at reduced power for days or even weeks, if required.

Announcing The 2nd Annual BVARA CW Roundup!

Date: Feb 26, 2026 Time: 7:00 to 8:30 PM (EST) Frequency: 28.04 to 28.06 MHz 100W Max

Feb 27, 2026 Time 0:00 to 01:30 UTC

Operating Classes: *CLASS A* – BVARA member – Experienced CW operator

CLASS B – Newcomer or newer CW operator (BVARA member or non-member)

CLASS C – Non-BVARA member – Experienced CW operator

CLASS D – Listeners who copy only (log calls of participating stations you heard)

CQing: Send “CQ CWR CQ CWR”

Exchange: Signal report (including operating class) / QTH (your location) / Name

Example: You are a newer CW operator and you are in a QSO with KD3XYZ whose signal is readable, their signal strength is registering a '7' on your S-meter and their signal tone is good. Your (example) callsign is W3ABC, you live in Ambridge, and your name is Bruno. You would then send something like:

KD3XYZ DE W3ABC (KD3XYZ this is W3ABC) BT (break)

RST IS 579 B 579 B BT (signal report and class)

QTH IS AMBRIDGE, PA AMBRIDGE, PA BT

NAME IS BRUNO BRUNO BT

HW CPY? (how did you copy my transmission?)

KD3XYZ DE W3ABC K (over)

The other station would then reply with their information using the same format. After the exchanges are completed, short informal remarks can be made during the QSO if desired, after which the contact would end with something like:

TNX FER QSO (thanks for the QSO)

GL ES 73 (good luck and best wishes)

KD3XYZ DE W3ABC SK (end of contact)

Description of event:

This 1½-hour event is not a contest.

Rather, it is a celebration of our area newcomers new to CW, returners to the mode of CW, and listeners. Also, it is an invitation to our veteran CW operators to enjoy helping the newcomers in making live, on-air CW contacts. There are no points scored, and no results or standings posted.

You do NOT have to be a member of the BVARA to participate.

A handsome certificate will be issued to each participant submitting a log entry from the event (see above)

The magazine was also published in [France](#) with partial translation of the original edition between 1995–2000 (ISSN 1267-2750). Published by CQ Communications, the title is based on the [radio call "CQ"](#).^[3]

CQ Amateur Radio previously organized, adjudicated, and published the results of several annual [radio competitions](#):


- CQ World Wide 160 m Contest

WWROF administers the infrastructure for contest log submission, log checking, and performs other services in support of the contests.^{[5][6][7]}
