


HF DXing, Contesting, and Other Thoughts

Including:

Continuing with our BVARA Presentation Series this year, our topic this month updates a presentation from over seven years ago. This one is a favorite of mine because it ties together many aspects of the hobby, including goals, technology, technical factors, automation, personal operating styles, contesting, and so much more!

First, we'll examine where hams now live and how the demographics have changed over time. Lifestyle observations of the ham population may just surprise you. What will it take to qualify for a WAS or DXCC award? Are paper QSL cards so 'yesterday' with the advent of LOTW? Next, we'll offer our 'definition' of DX. It's really a matter of your perspective. What are your strategies for dealing with the inevitable chaos of those pile-ups? Is it time to rethink your approach?

Then we'll step back just a bit to review the history of contests within the ham world and how they have evolved over time. What are the major elements of a contest? Is your station automation and technical capabilities up to the challenge? Is it time for some new tools or a better location? Then there's that pesky sunspot cycle to deal with.



But wait, there's more! What about new controversies surrounding SO2R and remote operation from super locations with super antennas and equipment? Isn't that an unfair advantage that should be addressed? Whether you are a beginner or a veteran ham, bring your questions to the meeting because this is one exciting presentation that you won't want to miss.



Propagation



When are the bands open? These charts, generated using CAPman, show probabilities for average HF propagation in the month of May for the paths indicated. The horizontal axes show Coordinated Universal Time (UTC), and the vertical axes frequency in MHz. On 10% of the days of this period, the highest frequencies propagated will be at least as high as the upper red curves (HPF, highest possible frequency) and on 50% of the days they will be at least as high as the green curves (MUF, classical maximum usable frequency). The blue curves show the lowest usable frequency (LUF) for a 1500-W CW transmitter. For SSB or a lower transmitter power, the LUF will be somewhat higher than the blue curves indicate. See Oct 1994 QST, pp 27-30, and Feb 1995 QST, pp 34-36, for more details. The predictions assume an observed 2800-MHz solar flux value of 82. This is a Low level of solar activity. See the detailed propagation tables on The ARRIL Antenna Book CD-ROM.

- 5. The test fee of \$15 cash, check, or money order.







Bits and Pieces

For the month of May I introduce Adam Horniak, KG3L, as the "Interview with a Ham" amateur radio operator. I met Adam about three years ago at a Beaver Valley Amateur Radio Association club meeting one Thursday evening. He made me feel welcome. I really got to know

him better by attending BVARA Thursday morning breakfasts.

As I was interviewing Adam he said, "I have always been interest-



ed in radio. When I was young a neighbor gave me a Sears Silvertone radio. The radio had a bad hum. 'Rudi M.' my father's friend and our family TV repairman instructed me how to fix it. He also gave me brand new modern capacitors to complete the repair." Adam was really encouraged

by being able to repair the radio 'all by himself'. "Rudi Mahalic, W3CXX, became my Elmer. He was tough. He told me I had to learn Morse code. That was all there was to it. So I did. I took all my FCC license tests at the Holiday House in Monroeville. The old time FCC test examiners were tough! They were downright scary. They had you take the Morse code portion of your test first. If you did not pass the CW there was no further testing! You had to come back for another test session. When I took my second test, I passed the CW portion. I sat down and did the written portion very quickly; the test administrator told me "You couldn't have passed you were too fast, you failed". I felt he was wrong. I knew all the answers. I felt good about the test. I didn't fail, I passed! Back then FCC testing was intimidating. Not at all like today's kindly volunteer examiners." Adam chases rare DX with a passion. He was fun to interview and has had some interesting contacts. Like a cross-country team that skied from Russia to Canada. They traveled right over the North Pole. Adam talked to them via satellite. Adam was in the U.S. Navy associated with radio, he made no transmissions. He was stationed at a listening post. Ask him, he has some great stories.

Once you meet Adam you will know of his love for the Lord. Adam is very active at his local Church. I encourage you to meet Adam, he has much to share.

With the nice weather it's time to check all your antennas & their support points, co-ax, transmission lines and safety grounds. Clean all those grounds, make them shiny. Put some conductive grease to protect your handy work from corrosion. Hamfest time is here. I am looking forward to face to face QSOs. I hope you make time to attend some hamfests too. As always, I encourage you to be safe in <u>all</u> that you do. Be safe. Planning is everything. Just a few minutes used to analyze a situation could be the difference between a great radio day and an accident.

Interview with a Ham

Did you ever make a crystal radio? Yes, made one as a kid. I just made one this year.

Did you ever listen to short wave radio? Yes, my neighbor gave me a Sears Silvertone short wave radio. It had a bad hum. I fixed it myself. My dad's friend Rudi Mahalic, a TV repairman, gave me the capacitors & knowledge I needed to fix it.

Did you ever use CB radio? Yes in the mid 1970s

How did you get interested in Ham Radio? As a child I was always interested in radio. My dad's friend, our TV repairman, My Elmer, Rudi Mahalic W3CXX really got me into amateur radio. By repairing the Sears Silvertone radio by myself, I was hooked.

Did you ever build a Ham Radio? No, but I tried once.

What was your first radio? A Yaesu FT101E . I still have it and it works.

What was your first antenna? A random wire loaded into a tuner.

What is your current antenna & radio? A Kenwood TS 830S, Mosley TA33 antenna, tower and rotor.

What are your favorite modes to operate? Phone, CW and Satellite

Your most memorable contact? The International Space Station, twice. Astronaut Doug Wheellock. I received two QSL cards.

What was your most fun contact? An airline pilot on 20 meters. Satellite contacts with a group of cross county skiers that started in Russia and finished in Canada.

What part of the hobby interests you the most? (field day, home brewing, contesting, Hamfests, restoring old radios) Picking up rare DX and countries I haven't worked before.

Have you ever been on a fox hunt? No

Do you use a logging program? (what is it) Yes, N1MM, nice software easy to use.

Would you purchase a Software Defined Radio? No, I would rather flip a switch or turn a knob.

Do you use automation with your Ham Radio? No


If you had a magic wand and could change Ham radio what would you change and why? I would change the sunspot activity to cause max propagation for amateur radio right now.


