VE testing begins at 5:00 PM.





Propagation



When are the bands open? These charts, generated using CAPman, show probabilities for average HF propagation in the month of September for the paths indicated. The horizontal axes show Coordinated Universal Time (UTC), and the vertical axes frequency in MHz. On 10% of the days of this period, the highest frequencies propagated will be at least as high as the upper red curves (HFF, highest possible frequency) and on 50% of the days they will be at least as high as the green curves (MUF, classical maximum usable frequency). The blue curves show the lowest usable frequency (LUF) for a 1500-W CW transmitter, For SSB or a lower transmitter power, the LUF will be somewhat higher than the blue curves indicate. See Oct 1994 QST, pp 27-30, and Feb 1995 QST, pp 34-36, for more details. The predictions assume an observed 2800-MHz solar flux value of 69. This is a Very Low level of solar activity. See the detailed propagation tables on *The ARPL Antenna Book CD-ROM*.




Here are the successful participants in our VE process the month :

Field Trip to Durbin, Cass, and the Green Bank Radio Telescopes

Members of the BVARA visited and toured the Green Bank Radio Telescopes* in Green Bank, WV on Friday, August 30th, 2019. The telescope sits near the heart of the United States *National Radio Quiet Zone*, a unique area where authorities limit all radio transmissions to avoid emissions toward the GBRT and the NSA's Sugar Grove Station. We took the General Tour followed by the SETI (Search for Extra Terrestrial Intelligence) Tour after lunch.

The largest radio telescope on site has an active surface area of 2.3 acres and measures approximately 328' by 361' using 2,004 surface panels that are individually adjusted for optimum position.

At a height of over 485 feet, it is taller than the Statue of Liberty and the Leaning Tower of Pisa. Operational frequencies range from 290 MHz to 100 GHz. Pointing accuracy is the diameter of a quarter at a distance of three miles!

On Thursday, we stopped at Durbin, WV to take a train ride on the *Rocket* coal-fired steam engine for a beautiful ride on the Durbin Greenbrier Railroad. Our journey began at the confluence of the East and West Forks of the Greenbrier River and proceeded along the tracks close to the bank of the river at times as we steamed along to and from the Hevener Station for a total of 10.5 miles. Ah, the smell of burning coal and the smoke and ashes in the air is not soon forgotten!

Thursday evening dinner in Cass, WV presented us with an exceptional once-a-year opportunity to attend an Historical Walking Tour of Cass (Population 52) with appetizers at each of eight planned stops. That was followed by their annual 'Farm to Table' dinner at the *Last Run Restaurant* to commemorate the dinners that had been provided to the loggers who worked hard all day in the forest for the Company that also owned the entire town. Our walking tour included company homes, the Jail House that accommodated up to 12 guests, their museum, and other sites of interest. Entertainment during dinner was provided by Rich Pawling, an award-winning educator and interpreter who also played the harmonica, the guitar, the banjo, and the mandolin with his own vocal interpretations of West Virginia local music. Our delicious dinner was served family style with all home-made choices. That entire evening was quite unique and memorable on many levels. I'm glad we chose not to eat at the hotel/motel that evening.
