ARMAD is an annual NON - POLITICAL Amateur Radio Public Service project that stands for Amateur Radio Military Appreciation Day. AR-MAD works with National Military Appreciation Month during the Month of May. It also provides other events, and works with other groups as requested during the

year. It asks Amateur Radio Operators from around the world to team up during this effort to allow the people from our communities to gather at public locations such as shopping centers, parks, VA hospitals, and sporting events to express verbal positive support "LIVE" over two way radio for members of the Military, Veterans, Reserves, National Guard, Retired, Coalition Forces, First Responders, and Military Support Groups. Many

of us have friends, relatives, and neighbors that are active duty, and past members of the armed forces. AR-MAD gives us the chance to support one another, and to express our thanks and appreciation to those that sacrifice and serve in the Armed Forces. BVARA eQSL Activated for ARMAD

In addition to offering Special Certificates to those who work or participate in the BVARA's ARMAD event, the club has activated its eQSL Internet based account to offer eQSL's during the event.

The world's first and only eQSL exchange centre, www.eQSL.cc, started the year 2001 with a bang. Only a few weeks earlier, on the first of December, it had blown through the 1 million card mark, and now 2 million cards were in the central database. But instead of slowing down, the rate increased as thousands of eQSL cards were uploaded every hour. (Continued on Page 3)

The eQSL.cc site was launched in April of 2000, and included about 1500 hams who had been part of an earlier experiment in an electronic OSL card exchange. The "big" idea was that eQSLs should not be sent around from person to person via e-mail, but should be available at any time through a web-based exchange system and a central database.

Other concepts using e-mail or by posting one stock

QSL card on a web page and calling it an eQSL were not satisfactory, because security could not be guaranteed, e-mail addresses had to be looked up, and the sender had to laboriously design his QSL card using



graphic design software. (Continued on Page 4)

The main goal of ARMAD is to generate publicity for our hobby while providing a great public service to our local communities, our military members; and their families.

ARMAD also encourages Military Support Groups, and Veterans organizations to be involved in the event. It can be a small event or a community affair with as much activity such as entertainment, speakers, and other participation as each ARMAD location or individual venue wants to organize.

How do you get involved with ARMAD? Mainly by just getting on the air and calling CQ ARMAD. This can be done as an individual at home, mobile, or as an Amateur Radio Club effort. We invite you to check in with the host ARMAD location in Fort Wayne, and with other stations that are involved on air during the event. We encourage you to set up at public venues, such as parks, VA Hospitals, Military Bases or other Memorial Day Events. We have found out that people like the idea of helping to support those that serve our Country, and want to learn more about Amateur Radio.

Why participate in ARMAD? ARMAD helps us promote Amateur Radio to the general public. It also provides a public service that is for a good cause. Our Troops, and

So, we used our 25 years of software development and database design experience to develop a site where each user could guarantee his identity with a scanned image of his ham license, could lay out an eQSL card design using simple point-and-click forms, and could upload logbooks either one-at-a-time, or by uploading an entire ADIF format log file at once. The concept is such a break-through, we have patents pending on its technology.

To retrieve one of these eQSL cards, the recipient only need enter the callsign, date, and band of the QSO he wants to retrieve, and if the other ham has entered that QSO into the system, up pops the complete eQSL card, ready for printing on a local printer. Furthermore, if the recipient registers his callsign with us, he can get a listing of all incoming eQSLs, and can just point and click to print each card received. Sending a reciprocal card back is a matter of clicking a button!

Apparently, most everyone else thinks this is the right way to do it, too. Another six weeks after hitting the 2 million card mark, it appears the number of cards will double again to 4 million.

Many of the members of the eQSL.cc site are using stock images for their eQSL card designs. But since it is possible to upload a graphic image to use on one's card, there are many custom cards online as well. Users are signing up from over 180 countries all over the world. In many places, a stack of 500 traditional QSL cards might well cost the average ham operator and entire year's salary. On eQSL.cc, 500 beautiful full-color cards can be sent for free!

In an era when "dot coms" are failing left and right, it is noteworthy that the eQSL.cc site, which is supported almost entirely through voluntary donations, has been operating in the black since Day One. Since the site runs virtually without any human intervention, the only ongoing expenses are for development of new features, and for continually increasing disk space, processor power, and bandwidth. A small amount goes to answering the questions and suggestions that come into the webmaster's office by e-mail. In most cases, replies are returned within the same day.

Not everyone agrees that eQSLing is the way to go. Some people like to get their hands on that stiff cardboard with the exotic stamps that spent months in transit from the jungles of some island that is only above water for 3 weeks out of the year. Others are bothered that some amateur organizations still have "no electronic transmission" clauses in the rule books for their awards. Others still are spooked by the privacy issues that this interconnected new world brings up. (Continued on Page 5)

But it's very difficult to argue - as the saying goes - with success. And 4 million cards is success by anyone's measure. At the present growth rate (with the number of eQSLs doubling every month), eQSL.cc could be home to virtually all of the world's amateur radio operators within a couple of years. Contest "big guns" will be able to "QSL 100%" within a matter of minutes, saving hundreds of hours of time and thousands of dollars in the process. DXpeditions will be able to "QSL 100%" on the spot, whether it be from that desert island with a dial-up Internet connection, or when the crew gets back to "civilization". It's just a quick log file upload, and they are done!

And eQSLs, unlike their traditional cardboard counterparts, can be verified through automated computer interfaces by amateur organizations wanting to validate award and contest submissions. The presence of a scanned license image on file for each user goes way beyond the simplistic checking that is possible using the older traditional QSL cards.

And now eQSL.cc is also a favorite site for SWLs, because users can identify themselves as either licensed amateur operator, or SWL. The eQSL cards between SWLs and hams are automatically configured to contain proper SWL phrasing, making their lives easier and saving them tons of money.

Complex systems shouldn't be designed in a vacuum, so we have assembled a capable group of hams and SWLs into an Advisory Board. Among these advisors are users with satellite and DX experience, contesting backgrounds, and international origins, as well as technology gurus and people with long-term operating histories. This group discusses current issues and future development plans for the site on a daily basis. Just another feature of the interconnected world we have entered as the 21st Century dawns.

There were nay-sayers when SSB first began to push CW aside. There were those who thought packet radio was just a short-lived fad. Others thought we shouldn't be wasting money on amateur satellites. And some people think eQSLs are "not natural". But for tens of thousands of hams and SWLs who upload their entire logbooks nightly in an effort to live up to the "100% QSL" promise of amateur radio, the final courtesy of a QSO is an eQSL.!

eQSL FAQ

• How can I print eQSLs on my 4x6 (A6) postcard printer? After you have clicked the "Display" button from your InBox or Archive, there is a link at the bottom of the popup window below the eQSL graphic that will give you a "4x6 (A6) Printable Format". The printable format eQSL will appear in that same window, but without all of the text below the card graphic. Click the PRINT button on your browser's toolbar, and then set the "preferences" for your printer.

Normally, you will specify a high quality paper such as "Canon Photo Paper Pro" or equivalent. Select the "4 x 6" or "A6" or "Postcard" format, and use "Landscape" mode. Place the paper into the printer vertically oriented. If you can perform a "Print Preview" before printing, do that the first time, so you can see that the card will appear in the correct dimensions on the paper.

We use the Canon i850 and i950 printer here at eQSL.cc, and can give you specific advice on papers and settings for that printer, if you need it. You should be able to use Epson, HP, and other printers as well. The card will have a border line drawn around it with 3.5 inch by 5.5 inch dimensions, in case you need to trim the paper to make the card fit into popular QSL card holders. We are working on a modification to allow you to print QSO details on the back side of the card. See "Site News" for details when this is ready.

• What is an eQSL? Clever hams were sending electronic QSL cards by e-mail years ago. Back then, that was the only way to send them. But <u>e-mail is not a very easy way</u> of exchanging cards. So, in 1998, we created the first eQSL exchange and called it www.QSLCard.com, and it has attracted a huge following. Our system does not use e-mail at all. So you really don't "send" eQSLs. Instead, it stores your log in a large database. When another user uploads his log, we look at all the log entries that "match", and allow you to display and print eQSLs from those matching log entries.

In April, 2000, we converted the entire system to a very robust and high tech database-oriented system and renamed our site *www.eQSL.cc, the Electronic QSL Card Centre*.

We are now the ONLY exchange for electronic QSL cards, with 99.0 million eQSLs from 312 countries currently online. And, since virtually all of our technology is covered by patents pending, you can be assured that this will continue to be **the place** to maintain your online eQSL log! (Continued on Page 7)

• Why do we need Electronic QSL cards?

- Conventional QSL cards take time to write out
- Conventional QSL cards cost money to print and mail
- You have to wait a long time to get a conventional QSL card in the mail
- If your QTH or other fixed data change, you have to reprint the cards

Rare DX stations would much rather use electronic QSL cards (read GU3WHN's comments)

• What does an eQSL card cost? Nothing. The eQSL.cc basic service is free. We only ask that you <u>make a donation</u> if you want to use a custom graphic of your own design, or if you want to participate in contests and awards we offer.

• **Does ARRL accept eQSLs for awards and contests?** No. ARRL plans to have its own mechanism for submitting logs for DXCC called "Logbook of the World". You will need to download special logging software and submit your license and other identification to use their system. Then you must pay a fee for each credit used for DXCC. The ARRL system is not designed to generate QSL cards. Check the <u>DXCC information page</u> for details.

• How do you prevent fraudulent eQSLs from being posted? Any user in the eQSL.cc system who wants to have his authenticity guaranteed can upload a scanned image or a digital photo of his amateur operator or station license, or his SWL license. We will visually inspect it to verify that it appears to be a valid license issued to your callsign. Then we issue an <u>Authenticity Guaranteed</u> certificate and put the Authenticity Guaranteed logo onto each outgoing eQSL. This is the equivalent of a digital signature. We also have several other programs to verify your identity. For more details, read the <u>Authenticity Guaranteed page</u>.

• How does eQSL.cc make any money at this? We don't. Our expenses are covered by a few select advertisers and by donations from users who find our service valuable.

• How do I use this system to *retrieve* a QSL from someone? To ensure the integrity and security of the system, you need to register before you can retrieve cards. This only takes a few moments.

After you register, you can go to your <u>InBox</u> and click the "Display/Print" button on the card you want to display. It will pop up a separate window containing the card. You can print it if you like.

• How do I use this system to send QSL cards? First, you must register. Then you can specify the static (fixed) information that goes on every QSL card. This can be edited at any time on the Edit Your Profile page. Then, specify your card style, layout, colors, and fonts on the My eQSL Design pages.

· How will I know if there are any QSLs waiting for me?

• If you are not logged in yet, enter your callsign in the Retrieve QSL Card box in the Visitors column on the front page.

If you are logged in, follow the InBox link.

• Why aren't you called eQSL.com? What does .cc mean? When domain names were opened up a few years ago to allow non-US firms to grab .com domains, a French limousine company registered eQSL.com and has been holding onto it ever since. Their application has nothing to do with amateur radio or eQSL Cards.
