BVARA TO REACTIVATE EXPLORER POST

During the past several months, Jack, KZ3Z along with several other club members have been working with Baden American Legion BSA Troop 405. To date, Jack has licensed three scouts and anticipates licensing three more along with two parents within the next few months.

Several of the newly licensed scouts have expressed an interest in participating in BVARA activities and meetings. In fact, WA3ZRM recently appointed one of these scouts (Evan, KB3QFR) as the club's Second Vice President.



In an effort to keep the momentum going, Pam, W3PMS has volunteered to reactive the club's Explorer Post. First Chartered in 1984 as Post 730, the Post will be reorganized under a new number—Post 73.

By way of background, Exploring is Learning for Life's career education program for young men and women who are 14 (and have completed the eighth grade) or 15 to 20 years old. Adults are selected by the participating organization for involvement in the program. Color, race, religion, gender, sexual orientation, ethnic background, economic status, or citizenship is not criteria for participation.

Exploring's purpose is to provide experiences to help young people mature and to prepare them to become responsible and caring adults. Explorers are ready to investigate the meaning of interdependence in their personal relationships and communities. Exploring is based on a unique and dynamic relationship between youth and the organizations in their communities. Local community organizations initiate an Explorer post by matching their people and program resources to the interests of young people in the community. The result is a program of activities that helps youth pursue their special interests, grow, and develop.

Pam anticipates kicking off Post 73 during Field Day weekend. She is working with BSA Pittsburgh Council to launch a mass mailing to several hundred young adults in our area that have expressed an interest in the Engineering and Technology fields. These eager youth's will be invited to the BVARA Field Day event to be held in late June.

In the best tradition of yellow journalism, I have plucked this gem off of KF3V's website. And, in keeping with unfair and unbalanced news, Thom is now viewing this classic photo of himself, just as you are, for the very first time— unannounced and unrehearsed!

Rhetoric is beginning to "heat-up" on QRZ.COM concerning the ARRL Division elections. A quick visit to the following link: http://forums.qrz.com/showthread.php?t=152397 will provide eQRM readers with a wealth of information about races in both the Delta and Atlantic Divisions.

What follows are some snip-its from the aforementioned QRZ forum. Due to space limitations, comments have been edited. Readers are encouraged to visit the QRZ Forum listed above for a complete transcript.

WA3ZRM POSTS: I think this thread is great. It's to bad the ARRL does not have forums available on their website. Speaking of which... if you were to become Delta Division Director, would you make any recommendations as to changing the design and content of the official League website? If so, what changes would you like to see? I also have a few other questions that I hope you can answer:

- 1. Why are ARRL Board meetings not open to a limited number of observers when non-personal matters are discussed?
- 2. Does the ARRL have a working Strategic Plan? If so, how does it address the future of our hobby over

the next three to five years?

- 3. I have been told by more than one League official that the ARRL Strategic Plan is a confidential document. Is this true and if so, why?
- 4. Is eliminating the \$3.00 senior member discount in 2009 part of the ARRL's Strategic Plan or just an attempt to provide a quick fix to a much larger problem?
- 5. Does the ARRL have specific projections that detail anticipated growth in our hobby? If so, what are these projections and how were they arrived at?

K5MC RESPONDS: Thanks very much, Bob, for your comments and questions. It is unfortunate that the ARRL currently does not have forums on its website; I think adding such a feature would be very worthwhile. If I'm elected Delta Division Director, I will work on this issue along with

the items outlined earlier in my platform. (It is my understanding that the Board of Directors and the HQ staff in Newington do recognize that the layout of the League's website needs to be more "user friendly" than it presently is.)

Here are my current thoughts on your remaining questions:

1. In my reading of the ARRL Articles of Association and By-Laws posted on the League's website, I can't find exactly who is eligible to attend the meetings of the Board of Directors (BOD). Item 14 of the By-Laws defines who the members of the ARRL BOD are (the President, the Vice-Presidents, the Treasurer, and the 15 Division Directors). Item 16 points out that the President is authorized to invite the president of another IARU member Society to attend, whereas Item 41 discusses who may/should attend meetings of the Executive Committee. It's interesting that those in attendance at the BOD meeting in January 2008 "at the invitation of the Board as observers" (according to the minutes posted on the ARRL website) were the RAC President, the Vice Directors, the ARRL General Counsel, the Membership and Volunteer Programs Manager, and one Past Director. Thus, the current rules apparently do allow the BOD to invite anyone it wishes to "observe" a meeting. I cannot answer why the BOD, as a general rule as far as I can tell, chooses not to invite a limited number of "rank and file" members (or members who write for non-League publications) to attend Board meetings. However, unless personnel decisions are under discussion, I strongly believe the advantages of open Board meetings outweigh whatever disadvantages might be suggested. 2/3. Concerning your second and third questions, as you know I recently emailed Henry WD4Q (the current Delta Division Director) about the ARRL Strategic Plan. As the current LA Section Manager (but only until the end of March), I asked Henry to forward me a copy of the Strategic Plan or to explain WHY the Board considers it a confidential document. Henry responded quickly but somewhat vaguely to my message; he did state that he would inquire about the current status of the Strategic Plan (assuming such a plan exists) and WHETHER the Board considers it confidential. (Bob, until you mentioned the ARRL Strategic Plan in your recent email to me, I don't recall hearing anything about the ARRL Strategic Plan, even though I've been the LA SM for the past eight years. Perhaps I wasn't paying close attention, however!)

- 4. About the only answer I now have to your fourth question is that the minutes of the January 2008 BOD meeting (minute number 26) points out that the elimination of the \$3.00 senior discount starting next year was recommended by the League's Administration and Finance Committee, along with the fact that all Directors voted in favor of the recommendation except Messrs. Allen, Sarratt, and Norton, who voted opposed. (I'm assuming that the Board decided the League needs more money and that the Board took this specific action thinking it would probably result in more income rather than less, at least over the next few years or so!)
- 5. Although I don't have the numbers handy at the moment, I do believe the ARRL has published some projections or goals concerning growth (e.g., 30,000 new hams over some specific period of time?). However, I have no idea how the numbers were arrived at. They may have been "pulled from the air" or perhaps some type of study was made by someone. It might be a simple matter for any member to ask his Division Director for detailed information on this matter, but I haven't done so yet.

N5KWB POSTS: I would like to know how you could get more transparency in what the ARRL discuses at their meetings. Understanding that some things may need being kept close, still too much bad can happen in closed rooms. As a Division Director what can and would you do?

K5MC RESPONDS: Tom, I think the vast majority of the issues facing the ARRL Board of Directors are not of a confidential nature. Therefore, if I'm elected I will try to convince the other Directors that attendance at the Board meetings should not be limited to the Officers, Directors, and Vice Directors as they currently appear to be. Of course, the attendance by interested members will be limited by the size of the meeting room, along with any occasional personnel issues that would very likely need to be handled in an executive session.

In reading the By-Laws I see nothing that explicitly states that the meetings are closed to the members. It might be a simple matter to have the Board extend an invitation to a number of members to attend the meetings as observers based upon some selection criteria. As I've pointed out in my campaign platform, I think it's particularly important that the Board meetings be open to the members who write for non-League publications. I also agree with AB0WR that these "reporters" should be able to record the meetings and make the transcripts available to the general amateur public.

There's little doubt in my mind that, as far as the current ARRL national leadership is concerned, this matter of open Board meetings is the most sacrilegious in my platform. I am also not so naïve to doubt the likely behavior of the current leadership as described earlier by N7WR: if I'm elected, I will probably be ostracized by most of the current leadership as I work toward the changes outlined in my platform. However, if enough members will inform their Directors that they support such changes (and will only support candidates who share the same philosophy), then these constructive changes will occur.

WA3VJB POSTS: K5MC is really onto something with his campaign proposal to end the secret meetings of the ARRL's Board of Directors.

Clearly the closed-door, backroom style of deliberation has not served the League, its subscribers, nor the greater community of active and interested U.S. licensees.

Why <u>wouldn't</u> they try allowing outside observers into these meetings? If such openness causes the ruling clique to be inhibited at discussing certain issues, maybe that's a telling sign. Possible reasons: Competitors will get our secrets. Enemies will distort what we say. It would air our dirty laundry.

They're doing the same thing they accuse the FCC of doing – hiding their discussions.

K5MC POSTS: The past few days I have been in touch with several traffic handlers up in the Atlantic Division. Their responses to me via email concerning your current leadership are pretty much a mixed bag, just as it's been here on this thread. I suppose that should not be too surprising to anyone. One man's meat is another man's poison. My naïve political philosophy is to let folks know where I stand on the issues. I did admire Jim Haynie when he was the League President for his "courage" to post comments from time to time here on QRZ. I really don't understand why none of the current Directors (to my knowledge) appear willing to post comments occasionally. Just as I'm doing now before the election, I plan to continue to let hams know where I stand on the various issues if I do happen to become the new Delta Division Director. (If that comes to pass, I will, of course, make it clear to everyone that I'm speaking as a single Director and not on behalf of the ARRL Board of Directors.)

ABOWR POSTS: The idea that BOD meetings need to be private so that the Directors feel free to speak without having to worry about their words being publicized just amazes me.

This is more indicative of people that are afraid of criticism than anything else.

The very fact that what you say is open to the public (and since your votes *are* also what you say they should be public also) is what keeps representatives *honest*.

Having what you say open to the public forces you to think about what you are going to say in many ways. It forces you to do the necessary research and think positions through ahead of time. Is it what my constituents want? Do I have substantive arguments for what I am going to say? Can I convince my constituents that my vote is correct even if it is against their wishes? Why am I supporting this issue? Why am I against this issue?

Even better, it will put the Executive Staff back in a subordinate position. They will have to provide *their* positions far enough ahead of when the issues come up in the BOD meetings that the Directors will have sufficient time to *do* the activities above, -- including -- finding out what their constituents actually think about the issues and how they want to Director to act on the issue. It tends to act as a brake on the Exec Staff being able to bully things through the BOD. The BOD will no longer be able to be used as a rubber stamp by the Exec Staff through the tactic of "expediency".
