

### **New Technician Question Pool**

The Question Pool Committee (QPC) of the National Conference of Volunteer Examiner Coordinators (NCVEC) is due to release the new Technician class (Element 2) question pool to the 14 VECs on December 1, 2009; it will be released to the public in January 2010.

Each question pool for the three Amateur Radio license classes --Technician, General and Amateur Extra -- is reviewed on a four-year rotation. This new Technician class pool will become effective on July 1, 2010.

According ARRL Assistant VEC Manager Perry Green, WY1O, the QPC reviews the three question pools every four years to ensure that the questions are kept current with the latest amateur practice and technology, as well as addresses information relevant to that particular license class. "In the case of the Technician pool, the question set should provide for the new Technician licensee to be able to establish his station and operate it legally, courteously and safely. The Technician question pool and exam are intended to be the beginning of the journey into the Amateur Radio Service. It prepares the person for the enjoyment of operating, and that of preparing to learn electronics, the cornerstone of the education needed to obtain the further enjoyment that can come with the higher license classes."

Green is a member of the NCVEC's Question Pool Committee. Other members of the QPC include Chairman Roland Anders, K3RA (Laurel VEC), Larry Pollock, NB5X (W5YI VEC), Jim Wiley, KL7CC (Anchorage VEC) and Tom Fuszard, KF9PU (Milwaukee VEC).

# STUDY GUIDES TO BE USED IN UPCOMING BVARA LICENSE CLASSES

Technician Class—*The* No-Nonsense, No-Code Technician Class License **Study Guide** is based on a method developed by Bruce W8BBS. What he did for the earlier question pool is to rephrase each question in the form of a statement and then organize the statements to make them readable. Bruce was unable to update his manual for the question pool that went into effect in July 2006, so he gave us permission to do it. General Class—The No-Nonsense, General Class License Study Guide. This is the study guide for those taking the General Class license exam after July 1, 2007. It follows the same format as the Technician Class Study Guide. Note, though, that there are more questions in this pool, and in general, the questions are more technical than the Tech Class, so be prepared to study longer and harder than you did for the Tech test. ## New Technician Question Pool Continued from front page

Green said that earlier this year, the QPC solicited input from Amateur Radio operators concerning the new question pool, accepting input for new question topics and new questions, as well as suggestions for changes or deletions: "The QPC must rely on members of the Amateur Radio community to suggest questions and answers in a responsible manner to preserve a high level of legitimacy for our radio service, so the NCVEC QPC seeks input from the amateur community concerning a revision."

The new question pool will become effective for all examinations administered on or after July 1, 2010, and it will remain valid until June 30, 2014. The current Technician question pool that became effective July 1, 2006 will expire June 30, 2010. The new Technician pool contains approximately 400 questions, from which 35 are selected for an Element 2 examination. This question pool will contain graphics and diagrams, something new for this element.

The current General class question pool was effective July 1, 2007 and is valid through June 30, 2011.

The current Amateur Extra class pool was effective July 1, 2008 and is valid until June 30, 2012.

In addition to his parents, he was preceded in death by a brother, the Rev. John Morar; a sister, Margaret, and his son-in-law, John Shaffer.




# **QST Propagation Charts**



When are the bands open? These charts, generated using CAFman, show probabilities for average HF propagation in the month of December 2009 for the paths indicated. The horizontal axes show Coordinated Universal Time (uTC), and the vertical axes frequency in MHz. On 10% of the days of this period, the highest frequencies propagated will be at least as high as the upper red curves (HFF, highest possible frequency) and on 50% of the days they will be at least as high as the green curves (MUF, classical maximum usable frequency). The blue curves show the lowest usable frequency (LUF) for a 1500-W CW transmitter. For 83B or a lower transmitter power, the LUF will be somewhat higher than the blue curves indicate. See Oct 1994 (QST, pp 27-80, and Feb 1995 QST, pp 34-85, for more details. The predictions assume an observed 2800-MHz soler fux value of 104. This is a

# Hams Zove to Eat

#### Recipe of the Month: Blue Ribbon Chili



2 lbs/900g lean or extra lean ground beef

6 oz/170mL (half bottle) <u>Tropical</u> Salsa

1 cup/250mL ketchup

1/2 tsp/2.5mL Red Pepper Flakes

1 can (15 oz/420g) mushrooms

1 tsp/5mL Watkins Inferno Hot Pepper Sauce (for more heat, increase to taste)

Cook for two hours (stovetop: bring to boil and simmer for 1 hour). Add Red Pepper Flakes (if desired) and simmer for at least 1 more hour. Cool and refrigerate overnight. Reheat and serve.

Garnish with: shredded cheddar cheese, diced onions, diced green peppers, sour cream, red pepper flakes and saltine crackers.
